
2. Film Production Process

3. Roles in Film Production

- ★ **Producer** Makes sure the project runs smoothly. Fulfills the director's vision. In charge of the "big picture," including the budget, schedule, locations, and crew, so the director is free to concentrate on each scene as it is filmed.
- ★ **Director** Director is in charge of everything that is seen on camera. Emphasis is usually on the performances of the actors.
- ★ **Director of Photography (D.o.P.)/Cinematographer** On many small projects, operates the camera. The director of photography is responsible for conveying the style of the piece through a variety of shots and lighting schemes
- ★ Writer Is responsible for creating the project's story. Crafts a script for the film.
- ★ Gaffer Primary electrician on set. Works with the director of photography to make sure that all the lights on set are powered.
- ★ **Production Designer** In charge of decorating the set, selecting the wardrobe, and collecting any necessary props.
- ★ Foley Artist Creates sound effects that will be added in post-production.
- ★ Editor Assembles all the footage together into a final project. This includes selecting the best takes, trimming unnecessary scenes, and adding sound effects and music.
- ★ Boom Operator/Sound Mixer This position is responsible for placement of microphones on the subject or on a boom pole.



The Golden Ratio




5. Three-Act Story: Beginning, Middle, End

Nine Sentence Story - Pre-Production

Guidelines:

- 30 60 sec (excluding titles or end credits)
- No dialogue (visual story)
- School appropriate No violence
- Who is your audience?
- Consider props, costumes, locations, scenery, acting, lighting
- Use a variety of shot styles and compositions
- Divide up roles (each person should have at least one role)
